





'THE ONLY TRULY PRECIOUS THINGS IN THE HOUSE ARE OUR KIDS

says New York art dealer and gallery owner Paige West of her colourful beach pad on America's east coast. 'Our priority was to make it an open house for visitors and child and wear-and-tear friendly!'

Paige, her husband JC, and their children, Charlie, three, and twins Fred and Jack, nine months, have lived in their Long Island home for three years. 'Montauk is one of the most laid-back places I've ever been: there's no pretension,' says Paige. 'It's classless here. People just want to be together as a family. I call it the anti-Hamptons.' The couple had always been drawn to Montauk. JC's family owned a marina here, and 'when we got married we started coming out in the summer and renting', says Paige. 'Being here lowers my blood pressure instantly.'

So, what made Paige and JC plump for this particular property? 'It's on the highest point in a pretty flat area, with the marina forming an amazing backdrop. I also love the fact that it's "upside-down",' says Paige. The quirky three-floor layout means that the kitchen, living and dining rooms with one guest bedroom are on the top floor, with bedrooms and a pool level below, and a snug to chill out in down in the basement.

Fortunately, the house didn't need any structural work. 'We went to town on the aesthetics, though,' says Paige. When they first looked round, every wall was peach, with heavy curtains, rugs, oppressive dark wood and antique furniture. 'The house gets so much sunlight, it was begging to be opened up,' she says.

The first task was to rip out all the chintz, expose the floorboards and take everything back to basics. 'We painted every single inch of the house with emulsion from Benjamin Moore,' says Paige, who's the first to admit that she's obsessed with bright colours. 'Because we are by the sea, I wanted to play with bold shades. I warned JC that I was going

to really push the boat out and have lots of fun with colour.'

Indeed, every wall is a different hue.
Undeterred by sceptical friends, who said clashing colours would never work, Paige joined forces with a designer friend,
Ghislaine Viñas, to achieve exactly the right balance. 'She was fantastic at bringing my ideas to life and pushing me a little as well,' says Paige. 'The purple bedroom, which I was unsure about, is now my favourite thanks to her.' And she can't keep her once-dubious friends away – every weekend they have people to stay. 'I wanted each bedroom to have a unique feel and experience – like a really cool boutique hotel,' says Paige.

The couple's other aim – that no child could destroy anything in the house – didn't limit creativity, though. 'It looks like a normal living room, but we whitewashed the chairs and then added vinyl fabric, so you can walk in and sit down straight from the pool,' Paige says.

Inspiration for the décor came from other sources, too. 'I'm drawn to bright, modern art, and the design for some rooms was driven by this,' says Paige. Her favourite artists include Leah Tinari – 'She paints from old photos, which fits with the memories we're creating here,' – and Dirk Westphal, whose photo of the goldfish in the hall chimes perfectly with the house's sunny mood.

In terms of her aesthetic, Paige confesses she's something of a maximalist. 'I collect art, wine glasses... children! 



I knew the exact paint colour I wanted to use (Hot Paprika 3TM, 26YR 14/548 by Dulux is similar), that I wanted a white dining table, and that a coral chandelier would hang over it, she says. Chaplins sells similar dining tables. Vintage Chaplins sells similar dining tables. Vintage chairs were painted and reupholstered; Gio Ponti's Montina chair at Twentytwentyone is similar. The chandelier is from Moth Design in LA. Stolenspace Gallery sells bold modern artwork. BELOW The surf-themed snug was designed with the future in mind. This room will be ideal when the kids are teenagers, but even now they love watching movies here, says Paige.
